





 - Mismatch between activity and place



Sovereignty



Each Indian tribe begins its relationship with the federal government as a sovereign power, recognized as such in treaty and legislature."







Promote Planning & Community Involvement To Advance Sovereignty

- Information is a commodity that can be managed through tribal planning and policy to build consensus, streamline decision-making, justify funding requests, and maximize investments.
- The digital age promotes fragmentation and creates a unique opportunity for tribes and their members to increase competitiveness.
- Exercise and assert inherent powers through well-thought-out planning and coordinated public involvement to maximize opportunities and protect tribal interests.
- Consider adopting and implementing tribal public records laws to protect against unwanted commoditization or dissemination of information.
