TPL has a long, proud history of collaborating with more than 100 tribes and Indigenous communities on a variety of projects, resulting in protection, restoration, and access to over 200,000 acres.

Each of these partnerships and projects share the common goal of fostering stronger, healthier, and more resilient communities.



Current Land Return Projects


TPL is assisting 22 federally recognized tribes in 14 states with 30 land return projects. These lands have a fair market value of over \$200 million and an incalculable value to the tribes and Indigenous peoples who have called them home for millennia. Examples include:

- Penobscot Nation in Maine
- Cow Creek Umpqua Tribe in Oregon
- Klamath Tribes in Oregon
- Amah Mutsun Tribal Band in California
- Native Hawaiians in Hawai'i




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Tribal Background


- One of Nine Federally Recognized Tribes in Oregon
- Eleven-member council known as the Tribal Board of Directors
- Located in Roseburg, Oregon
- Seven County Service Area in Oregon
- Primary Economic Driver: Umpqua Indian Development Corporation
- Membership: 2,000
- Self-Governance Compact
- One of Two Tribes Managing Under the Indian Trust Assent Reform Act (ITARA)

- Land Acquisition Strategy and Funding Partnerships




